*Deuteronomy 2:16-25*

### ***He is Lord over:***

#### **I. People** – “distress them not, nor meddle with them” (vs. 16-19)

*He controls:*

- A. **Li** \_\_\_\_\_ - “when all the men of war were consumed and dead”
- B. **Lo** \_\_\_\_\_ – “pass over through Ar, the coast of Moab”
- C. **Li** \_\_\_\_\_ – “I will not give thee of the land of...Ammon”

#### **II. Power** – “The Lord destroyed them before them” (vs. 20-23)

*He creates:*

- A. **S** \_\_\_\_\_ - “a people great, and many, and tall”
- B. **St** \_\_\_\_\_ – “He destroyed the Horims from before them”
- C. **Sta** \_\_\_\_\_ – “dwelt in their stead even to this day”

#### **III. Possibility** – “begin to possess it” (vs. 24-25)

*He calls us to:*

- A. **Fa** \_\_\_\_\_ - “Rise up and take your journey”
- B. **Fi** \_\_\_\_\_ – “contend with him in battle”
- C. **Fe** \_\_\_\_\_ – “I will put the dread of thee and the fear of thee”
