# II. Conformity -"gods of the people...round about you" (vs. 12-15) Who we:

A. Fo\_\_\_\_\_- "beware lest thou forget the Lord"

**B.** Fe\_\_\_\_\_\_\_ - "Thou shalt fear the Lord thy God"

## III. Contrariness — "as ye tempted Him in Massah" (vs. 16-19)

When we are not:

A. Con\_\_\_\_\_ - "Ye shall not tempt the Lord your God"

**B.** Con\_\_\_\_\_\_ – "Ye shall diligently keep the commandments"
